GOD'S BIG PICTURE



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Main Objective:

For people to be able to trace the basic outline of the Bible story, identifying its main theme(s) and understanding how its various parts fit together.

Areas of Growth:

- **Conviction**: growth in our faith that the Bible is the inspired word of God with an accompanying sense of our need for it in personal transformation
- **Competence**: growth in our ability to employ a consistent Christ-centered interpretation of Scripture and to discern the gospel message set forth throughout the entirety of the Bible
- **Character**: growth in living out the implications of citizenship in God's kingdom being God's people in God's place under his rule and blessing

WEEK TWO

Chapter 1: The Pattern of the Kingdom

- 1. What do we learn about the character of God and about the material world through the creation account (Genesis 1-2)?
- 2. Do you think there is a contradiction between science and the Bible? Explain.
- 3. What are some important implications of humanity being created in God's image and how does it touch upon certain contemporary social issues?
- 4. What are some of the patterns for life in God's world that are established in Genesis 1-2 and how do we see these patterns breaking down in today's culture? What are some helpful ways we can respond to the breakdown?

- 2. According to the Bible, the fundamental problem with the world is human sin. Do you agree with this? What evidence for sin and its consequences would you point out in the world to support the Bible's claims?
- 3. Throughout this section on the perished kingdom, are there any signs of hope? Elaborate.
- 4. Were there things in this week's reading that you found insightful in helping you understand the Bible or personally encouraging and/or challenging in your walk with the Lord?

- 3. Have you ever wondered how people in the Old Testament before the time of Jesus were saved? How would you answer that question (Genesis 15:6)?

- 4. Were there things in this week's reading that you found insightful in helping you understand the Bible or personally encouraging and/or challenging in your walk with the Lord?

- 3. What progress in establishing the kingdom of God is seen during the time of the monarchy and how does this period look forward to the New Testament and find fulfillment in Jesus Christ?
- 4. Were there things in this week's reading that you found insightful in helping you understand the Bible or personally encouraging and/or challenging in your walk with the Lord?

- 3. How would you describe the coming kingdom of God envisioned by the Old Testament prophets, and how does their prophetic vision both look back and look forward? When were the promises of God's coming kingdom fulfilled?
- 4. Were there things in this week's reading that you found insightful in helping you understand the Bible or personally encouraging and/or challenging in your walk with the Lord?
